ANNOUNCEMENTS

The "Safely Gathering" committee continues to monitor cases and deaths in Marion County. Falling cases and death rates and increasing vaccinations are causes for optimism, but local case rates remain high enough that indoor gatherings of groups our size are still discouraged.

On Tuesday the Commission Chairs discussed how we will re-open once it's safe. We decided against having fully vaccinated people attend sooner; we will wait until it's safe for a larger group. At that point the building will need to be thoroughly cleaned and the pipes flushed, and safely distanced seating will be marked. We will likely start with just worship, adding other functions (meals, Sunday school, etc.) gradually as local case rates decline further.

Meanwhile, once you have been fully vaccinated and have waited at least 10 days after your last dose for full immunity, you may safely visit another person who is also vaccinated (wearing masks, staying distanced, and washing or sanitizing hands), so that we can support each other while we wait for inperson meetings at our building. **Martha Yoder**

After a brief hiatus, Indiana AID has started meeting again and is renewing its efforts to reach out to detained immigrants at the Clay County jail. Now that there is a new federal administration overseeing ICE, we are hopeful that we will have more success in gaining access to the people who are being detained. We have begun reaching out to ICE and the local jail again and have restarted our monthly "Immigrant Support meetings" on the first Monday night of every month. This offers a confidential sharing space for undocumented immigrants who are impacted by the detention system. Additionally, we have created a Facebook page (facebook.com/IndianaAID), which is designed to boost the legitimacy of our organization and create another means for people to connect to us. Feel free to like it and share it!

Although our formal efforts to negotiate with ICE have not yet been successful, the connections we have built among various advocacy groups have already helped several immigrant families in concrete ways. For example, one individual who came to us was directed to an agency that provided her with therapy and housing support, and an attorney with whom we've been working asked if we could provide a ride for a family to their court hearing in Chicago, which Shalom members were able to do. (Thanks Jeanne and Brad!) These are small ripples in a large system, but at least we are making some impact. I'd ask for your prayers for wisdom and perseverance as we continue to advocate for some of the most isolated people in the state of Indiana. **Brian Bither**

RELECTIONS ON THE JOURNEY

Every Careless Word: I was raised in a conservative Christian community that put a lot of emphasis on using respectful language. In fact, I understood this to be one of the fundamental marks of being a Christian, and one of the ways in which I witnessed to my non-Christian friends at my public school was by refraining from cursing or making crude jokes. However, by the time I entered college, I started discovering that there were more "liberal" Christians out there who didn't see anything wrong with cursing, and some preachers even incorporated cursing in their sermons or public speeches to make a provocative point. They would suggest that conservatives were too uptight about cursing and vigorously defend their use of cruder language.

On the other hand, it seems that conservatives and progressive has switched sides on this issue in recent years, which I find very disorienting. As the experiences of minority groups have become better understood in mainstream society, we are often asked to reform our language, adopting terms such as "Native Americans" or "people of color" or "Latinx," etc. However, I have found that many conservatives are dismissive of this new use of language, arguing that progressives are overly sensitive about language and that such self-regulating amounts to "cancel culture." They too vigorously defend their use of their language.

Admittedly, liberals and conservatives can go overboard in policing speech and making too much of minor verbal offenses. On the other hand, Jesus himself encourages us to be careful about the words we use. Last Thursday, our daily Scripture readings brought us to a text that I have always found convicting: "I tell you, on the Day of Judgment you will have to give an account for every careless word you utter; for by your words you will be justified, and by your words you will be condemned." (Matthew 12:36-37) This passage reminds me how much our words matter. The way we speak about things influences the way that we think about them and the dignity that we give them. Christ himself urges us to scrutinize our language to see if it reflects our love of God and love for our neighbor.

In the end, I appreciate the conservative culture that taught me not to be crude in a world that matters to God, and in the progressive culture that reveals the ways my language subtly denigrates others. One thing I am working on during this Lenten season is ensuring that even my private speech does not slip into "carless words" that treat God's people and world with less respect than they deserve.
