Last Sunday, February 17:

Wilma Bailey delivered the sermon. In recognition of Black History Month, the sermon examined bias and stereotyping in a Biblical story and what we might learn from it. Biblical text: Genesis 12:10-20.

This Sunday, February 24:

We will be discussing a major feature of Jesus' ministry: casting out evil spirits. This is pretty foreign to many Western Christians, which often leads to debates about whether or not demons "really" exist. Although that conversation has some value, most people don't realize that the "demons" the Bible describes have a deep connection to what we would call "systemic evils" or "institutional forces" in the twenty-first century. We'll be exploring these issues in some depth as we engage Luke 8:26-39.

Next Sunday, March 3: We will talk about how Jesus *himself* is instrumental in bringing about Jubilee as he reveals that he is the Messiah in Luke 9:18-27.

Hoosiers Concerned about Gun Violence:
On Saturday, March 2, at 12 noon, on the west side of the State House, Student March for Our Lives in Indiana will be holding a rally against gun violence, and for increased gun safety in Indiana. Hoosiers Concerned about Gun Violence is supporting this student-led rally, and invites all of you to participate.

Faith in Indiana (FII):

One of the local outreach organizations that Shalom supports is Faith in Indiana. Formerly called IndyCAN, Faith in Indiana is an ecumenical catalyst for people of good will to act collectively for racial and economic justice. In partnership with over 60 congregations, organizations, and the 17 largest denominations in Indiana, FII activates people through our deeply rooted shared values and stories of our people. Some concrete goals of Faith in Indiana for 2019 include:

1) expanding voter registration and holding candidate forums for municipal elections throughout Indiana in 2019, 2) working with Indianapolis Mayor Joe Hogsett and Metropolitan Police Chief Bryan Roach to

reduce violent crime in Indianapolis, and 3) oppose President Trump's emergency declaration to build a southern border wall.

Mennonite Central Committee (MCC):

MCC is a worldwide ministry of Anabaptist churches with about 1000 employees serving around the globe. MCC operates in more than 57 countries collaborating with 508 partners in ministries of relief, development, and peace building. In the U.S., the organization is divided into four regions: East Coast, Central States, Great Lakes and West Coast. Each region is incorporated with its own board and executive director. The Great Lakes region is made up of seven states.

In 2020, MCC will be celebrating 100 years of relief, development, and peace around the globe.

In 2018, Shalom contributed 9 blankets, 7 comforters, 27 hygiene kits, 19 infant care kits, 271 school kits, and 12 boxes of additional supplies. In 2018, MCC shipped 63,841 comforters and blankets, 69,375 hygiene kits, 78,035 school kits, 24,530 relief kits, 10,396 infant care kits, and 560 sewing kits, plus canned meat, soap, sheets, and fabric. Shalom is part of a great effort to help to make the human family more comfortable and healthy!

Milepost #669 Proclaiming in Parable?

During our sermon series on the gospel of Luke, we have seen that Jesus understood the *proclamation of Jubilee* to be a central part of his earthly ministry. Shortly after he began this ministry in Nazareth, he said, "I must proclaim the good news of the kingdom of God to other cities also, for I was sent for *this*

purpose." (Luke 4:43, emphasis added) That being said, if proclaiming the new order of things was a core part of his mission, then it seems odd that Jesus spoke in parables. After all, parables are intentionally unclear. When asked to explain a particular parable, Jesus once said, "To you it has been given to know the mysteries of the kingdom of God, but to others I speak in parables, so that 'looking they may not perceive, and listening they may not understand." (Luke 8:9-10) Now that doesn't make any sense at all. Why wouldn't Jesus want everyone to perceive and understand the mysteries of the kingdom of God? If he was sent to proclaim the good news, shouldn't he have done so in the clearest way possible?

One of the insights that Jesus had, which comes up in his teachings again and again, is that truth has to be sought in order to be appreciated. When I was a teenager, I remember that adult speakers would occasionally talk about this or that habit that you should try to develop early in your life so that you can extend your life into your 80s or maybe even your 90s. But all of these lessons went in one of my ears and out the other, because that seemed like an incomprehensibly long time from the present moment and I wasn't really ready to think about what it would be like to be old. On the other hand, now that I am in my 30s, I am beginning to experience the reality of aging, and I realize that it's only going to have a stronger and stronger impact on me as I get older. So now, when I hear an eighty or ninety-year old talk about some habit they developed that has made a big difference in their life, I pay attention!

When you hear a parable for the first time, it takes some effort to understand what it means, and this makes it a perfect form of speech for Jesus' purposes. Yes, Jesus came to proclaim the good news, but he didn't come to shove the good news down anyone's throat or to offer it as a cheap solution to those who weren't willing to put any effort into it. A large crowd of people might come to hear Jesus speak, but only those who took his words really seriously would still be discussing the parables days or weeks later, trying to discern what they mean.

Now this may be one area in which we cannot directly imitate Jesus. Few of us are clever enough to come up with parables off the top of our heads that explain the points we want to make. Nevertheless, we follow general principle of not "throwing our pearls before swine" in our daily conversations by assessing whether our conversation partners are genuinely interested in coming to a better understanding of truth. This simple assessment should guide us as we discern when and how to share God's truths with a world that needs to hear them.
