Last Sunday, May 26

In chapter 3, Micah focuses on the corrupt and greedy leadership – rulers, priests, false prophets – of Israel and Judah. He warns that, as a consequence, they will lose their ability to access God's Presence. Authentic leaders serve the people entrusted to their care, and true prophets call out injustice and speak God's truth. Today we see a similar failure of moral and spiritual leadership. What can we learn from the true prophets of the past and present? And does God ever leave us?

We begin studying a new section of Micah – Micah chapters 4 & 5 – which in contrast to the previous three chapters, does not focus as much on God's judgment and human sin but instead offers several images of hope. However, these images of hope sometimes conflict with one another, which raises the question, what does it mean to believe that God intervenes in human affairs? Can we trust God to spare us from suffering and disaster or not?

> MILEPOST #682 Righteousness vs Justice

In the introductory sermon of our Micah series, I cited a verse in Ephesians that claims that the Christian church is built "on the foundation of the apostles and prophets, with Christ Jesus himself as the cornerstone." (Eph 2:19-20) This passage emphasizes how important the prophetic writings were in the formation of our faith. However, if this is true, one wonders why so few of the concerns of the prophets show up in the New Testament. For example, in the three chapters of Micah that we have studied so far, we have heard Micah express concerns about bribery, unfair housing policies, and the cost of militarization. But none of these issues really come up in the writings of the New Testament apostles. While the prophets have a lot to say about public morality or justice, the New Testament writers focus primarily on personal morality or righteousness. What are we to make of this discrepancy? I believe that the differences between a prophetic book like Micah and an epistle 1 Peter has more to do with their different audiences than with different beliefs. Micah was preaching in public. He was focused on the ways in which his society as a whole was veering from God's plan for them, with special attention given to its political and religious leaders. Peter was writing a private letter to his fellow Christians. He was focused on encouraging them to live as ethically as possible, knowing that they were a minority group with little influence over national and international issues. Given these contexts, it is not surprising that the prophetic writings give more attention to justice while the letters of the apostles are more focused on righteousness. To use a modern analogy, if an internet researcher wanted to learn what issues I cared about by pouring through my emails to Shalom members, they would probably come to the conclusion that I don't care about justice much at all, because I usually focus on personal and church matters in those emails. However, if that same researcher studied me by looking at my social media posts, they would probably conclude that justice is one of the only things I care about - because that is an outlet I commonly use to invoke public support for issues that matter. To get a full picture of what kinds of things matter to me, you would have to draw from different kinds of sources. Similarly, to get a full picture of what kinds of things matter to God, we have to draw from the

different sources and genres in Scripture. We can't afford to focus just on the prophets or just on the epistles – we need both! After all, justice and righteousness go hand-in-hand. You can't have justice if individual people in society don't choose to be righteous, and it is very hard for individuals to experience healthy moral development in an unjust society. Indeed, the Biblical languages don't even have different words for justice and righteousness – it's all the same thing to them! May the Spirit of God direct and empower us to seek this righteousness/justice both in our personal lives and in our communities.
