Milepost #479 – Do Not Bring Us Into Temptation

This Sunday, we will have the special privilege to hear Gemina Trochez share her testimony during the sermon time. Gemina believes strongly in the power of prayer, and her life is a testament to its power. I can think of no better way to conclude our month-long focus on the spiritual discipline of prayer than to join her in this service of praise and thanksgiving. Because of this, I will be cutting my sermon series a little short, and so in this milepost, I wanted to offer a few words of on the final phrase of the Lord's Prayer: "And do not bring us into temptation, but deliver us from the evil one."

Many Christians throughout the centuries have found it troubling that Jesus taught us to ask God *not* to bring us into temptation. This is troubling not because of what it asks, but because of what it implies. It seems to imply that – if we don't offer this prayer – God *might* bring us into temptation. But why would God do that? The Bible teaches us that God loves us and that God is always working for our good. Indeed, James

3:13 specifically says that God does not tempt anyone. So why would we need to pray for God not to bring us into temptation?

While it is true that God does not directly tempt or test us, this does not mean that God will never bring us into the face of temptation. On the contrary, in order to transform us into the image of God, in order to give us the "life to the full," in order to bring about the kingdom of God, God often has no choice but to march us right into the places where temptation reigns. The deliverance of the Israelites from Egypt is the classic example. God promised to rescue Israel from Egypt and to take them to the Promised Land. However, in order to get the people of Israel to this new home, they had to go through the wilderness, which was a place of testing and temptation. Some Israelites complained that God had brought them into the wilderness, but that was a misinterpretation of God's action. Yes. God led them to the wilderness, but never with the intention of leaving them there. It was simply a necessary part of their journey to get to the Promised Land.

John Piper argues that the key to understanding this prayer is in the preposition. Jesus recognizes that God brings us through temptation, but he prays that God not bring us into temptation. There is a difference between encountering temptation and going through it and getting stuck there. I like this interpretation, because it is reinforced by the final phrase of the prayer: "but deliver us from evil." Here, we see the other half of the implication. Yes, there is evil in the world. We will all encounter it. And God may bring us right up to its doorstop. But we can pray that God will not bring us into temptation, and when we do face it, that God will deliver us from its power.
