<u>Last Sunday, (5/3)</u> Brian offered an introduction to the "Story of the Bible" sermon series, in which we will study the entire story of the Bible from Genesis to Revelation. Drawing from the Song of Songs, Brian claimed that what seems to be a miscellaneous collection of religious texts actually contains a divinely inspired story that features three main characters: God, the World, and the Chosen People.

<u>This Sunday, (5/10)</u> we will start Act I of our seven-act sermon series - "The Backstory: Creation and the Fall" - by engaging the bold and beautiful poem of Genesis 1, which takes us beyond mere scientific assertions and describes the world as orderly, purposeful, and good. This sets the stage for the entire story of the Bible, by reminding us that God has always loved the universe She created.

**Next Sunday**, **(5/17)** we will reflect on the tragic divide between God and creation, which is narrated in Genesis 3-11 and which has come to be known as "the Fall" by Christian theologians.

### Mennonite Disaster Service (MDS) by Jim & Linda Showalter

It was 8:30 am New Year's Day 2020 when we pulled out of our driveway with the travel trailer and headed down the new I-69 on our 3-day trip to south Texas near Corpus Christi. Arriving at the campground where the MDS RV group was set up, we met friends from last years' service and got introduced to the new folks. We were a group of 6 couples. Sunday morning, we all went to a local church (Baptist this week) then to lunch together.

Monday morning at 6 am we made coffee, ate breakfast, packed our lunches and then met together in the office trailer at 7:30 for a time of devotions, sharing, prayer, and getting instructions for the work for the day. Then it was off to the house we are building, unlock the tool trailer, get the needed tools and get some work done! A typical day might include hanging dry wall, or laying flooring, installing kitchen cabinets, and a lot of painting.

Our group consisted of retired folks with a variety of skills and experience in construction tasks. The new houses were framed and enclosed for weather by other groups, and then our group did the interior work to complete it. Mid-afternoon we packed up the tools, cleaned up and returned to the campground to rest! We had Friday to Sunday to rest and enjoy other things.

Then in mid-March we were told to shut down and return home due to the coronavirus. However, we convinced the MDS leadership to allow us one more week so we could complete our house for the well-deserving woman and her son. We returned home at the end of March having created new friendships, experiences, and sering as God's hands and feet during those three months.

# Reflections On Pilgrimage

One of my morning rituals is to read the daily meditation from Richard Rohr, a Franciscan priest and founder of the Center for Action and Contemplation. Last week the theme was "liminal space." "Liminal" comes from a Latin word which means "threshold," so liminal space refers to a time or stage of transition, or in-betweenness. "Liminal" is a good term for the time and space we are in right now. In one of the meditations, Rohr quotes a friend who wrote, "We may be impatient to pass through [liminal space] quickly with as little distress as possible, even though that is not likely."

This rings true as I have found myself eager for time to pass quickly so I can get to the future and go back to taking my harp into hospital rooms and hugging my grandchildren and mingling with people at a cultural event. By wishing away the present I miss God and the wisdom and beauty and life God is offering me here, now.

The 13<sup>th</sup> century Sufi poet, Rumi, wrote a poem that speaks directly to the "stay at home" orders many of us have struggled with these past weeks. I hope it reminds you – as it does me – to pay attention where you are:

BE MELTING SNOW

Totally conscious, and apropos of nothing, you come to see me. Is someone here? I ask.

The moon. The full moon is inside your house.

My friends and I go running out into the street. *I'm in here*, comes a voice from the house, but we aren't listening. We're looking up at the sky.
My pet nightingale sobs like a drunk in the garden.
Ringdoves scatter with small cries, *Where, Where*.
It's midnight. The whole neighborhood is up and out in the street thinking, *The cat burglar has come back*.
The actual thief is there too, saying out loud, *Yes, the cat burglar is somewhere in this crowd*.
No one pays attention.

Lo, I am with you always means when you look for God, God is in the look of your eyes, in the thought of looking, nearer to you than your self, or things that have happened to you There's no need to go outside.

Be melting snow. Wash yourself of yourself.

A white flower grows in the quietness. Let your tongue become that flower.
