OUTREACH: Relationships beyond Shalom

Among the ministries of the Quito [Ecuador] Mennonite Church has been helping refugees since 2002. These people come mostly from Columbia and Venezuela, where they may be fleeing violence or poverty, and are seeking a better life for themselves and their families. The COVID-19 pandemic has further complicated this ministry this year. Mennonite Mission Network (MMN) and Mennonite Central Committee (MCC) have combined to provide the resources for this ministry, which is part of the work of Delicia Bravo and Peter Wigginton. The church provides food such as rice, beans, powdered milk, and sugar to about 80-100 families per month. During the pandemic this ministry was especially important, because at other times many of the refugee families would get some income from day labor on the streets, which is not possible during the public health crisis. While Shalom regularly provides support for Peter and Delicia, we decided at the end of the year to share some of our extra funds to support their holistic ministry to our brothers and sisters in Quito. Let's celebrate with them the sharing of God's abundance. ~ Brad Yoder

REFLECTIONS ON THE JOURNEY

Introducing the New Testament Readings

At the end of Advent, those of us who have been following the Scripture reading assignments finished the Older Testament (except Psalms and Proverbs), and we will begin reading through the New Testament next week. If you got behind in your Old Testament readings or never started them, this is a great time for a fresh start! The New Testament assignments are easier for the average Christian than the OT readings, not to mention shorter. While we were in the OT, I assigned 4-7 chapters of reading per day, but in the NT, that will now be reduced to 2-5 chapters per day.

Those of you who are familiar with the New Testament know that it begins with four different accounts of Jesus' life ("the gospels"), which are followed by a book of the early church's history, the Acts of the Apostles, and the rest of the New Testament consists of letters written from various church leaders to the early Christian communities. The last of these letters, written by John from the island of Patmos, describes an apocalyptic vision that he had about his current day and the end of history, and it brings the Story of the Bible to a decisive conclusion. This structure raises some questions about how best to read through the New Testament. Since the four gospels cover largely the same material, should you read each gospel, one-at-a-time, or try to go through Jesus' life chronologically as you switch from one account to another? Should you read the epistles in the order in which they appear in the cannon, after the book of Acts, or try to insert them in the times when they were likely written? Then what do you do with the ones that don't fit clearly into the Acts timeframe?

I have decided to let the narrative books (Matthew, Mark, Luke, John, and Acts) and the apocalypse (Revelation) be the main focus of our readings each week, so that we will remember that first and foremost the Bible tells a *story*, and that the prophecies, wisdom literature, and epistles all flow out of that story. We'll start by doing an overview of each of the four gospels in turn, since each one has a unique perspective that it applies to the life of Jesus, and then we will start weaving them together in loose chronological order as we work our way through Lent and Easter. Rather than trying to fit the epistles in the story chronologically, the epistles will be paired with the readings thematically to help us make the connections about how our values flow from the life of Jesus and the early church. For example, the gospel of Luke – which gives the most emphasis to justice – will be paired with the epistle of James, who also focuses on that theme, while the gospel of John – which emphasizes Jesus' identity as the Son of God – will be paired with Colossians, which also focuses on Jesus' divine nature and unique identity. Along the way, we'll continue reading psalms and proverbs, to remind us that while the Bible is divided into two Testaments, it is one unified story.

If you have never read through the New Testament before, I strongly encourage you to give this a try. Something powerful and transformative happens when make the Word of God a part of our daily diet, and it's quite meaningful to be able to do it together with other members of our church community.
