Milepost #528 – Proper Images for God

Many of the Bible's instructions and commands are focused on worship. For example, out of the Ten Commandments, the first four commandments don't discuss interpersonal ethics at all, even though this tends to dominate our ethical discussions in the church today. Instead, they teach God's people how to worship God properly. Clearly, worship is important to God, and therefore God asks us to worship in a conscientious way. For example, in the second commandment, God says, "You shall not make for yourself an idol," which could also be translated, "You shall not make for yourself an image."

For a long time, I did not understand what the second commandment was all about. I assumed that it was forbidding the Israelites from worshipping the gods of other religions such as Baal or Zeus. But that is not the main concern here. Instead, the second commandment warns God's people not to make an idol or image of their own God. This was apparently a strong temptation for them they wanted to be able to see or imagine this mysterious God whom they were following. In fact, before Moses made it down from Mount Sinai with the Ten Commandments in his hands, they Israelites had created a golden calf and declared, "This is your god, who brought you out of Egypt." Now, this may have been well-intentioned, but by worshipping this calf and calling it God, they misrepresented who God is, which both dishonored God and caused harm to the community.

The problem of idolatry is still a major issue for God's people today. Although we don't tend to worship physical idols, we all have a tendency to project false images and conceptions onto our understanding of God often times without realizing that we are doing it. One of the subtlest ways that we engage in idolatry today is by envisioning God as male. Of course, when we stop to think about it, we acknowledge that God is not male for God is spirit, and therefore cannot be any more male than female. Nevertheless, when we continuously worship God in overwhelmingly male terms, we start to think of "maleness" as a characteristic of God, which creates the false impression that it is somehow holier or more complete than "femaleness."

As a pastor, I have made a point to use gender-neutral language as much as possible so that I don't encourage this misconception. Whenever possible, I have avoided referring to God with male pronouns or relying too much on male metaphors. But this has negative effects as well. By only referring to God as "God," it makes it harder for us to relate to God, it makes me feel like I'm walking on eggshells in every sentence I speak, and it puts me at odds with the Bible, which unapologetically uses human metaphors to describe God all of the time. After all, we have to have *some way* to think about God.

Fortunately, the Bible gives us a way out of this dilemma because, as it says in Genesis 1:27 – we are made in God's *image*. Consequently, human pronouns and metaphors can be used to help us imagine and relate to God. That being said, the very same passage that proclaims this truth – Genesis 1:27 – emphasizes that *both* males and females reflect God's image. So if we are going to use one, then we ought to use the other, lest our image of God becomes distorted.

Consequently, rather than trying to avoid using any kind of gendered pronoun or metaphor, I have made a personal decision to alternate back-and-forth between male and female imagery and pronouns for God in my sermons. Without making it a big point or agenda about this in the sermons themselves, I plan to use She/Her language on Sept 16

and He/Him language on Sept 23 when appropriate, and to continue alternating henceforth. I realize that this may be jarring or uncomfortable for some of us at first, but I am hopeful that this practice will ultimately help us identify some false images we have developed about God and to worship God more fully as the Spirit who transcends gender, and yet is revealed in it.
