- 2) doing a Zoom training on a Tuesday evening, and
- 3) phoning people on 1-6 Thursday evenings during September and October, to encourage them to vote.

Indiana Michigan Mennonite Conference is offering a series of webinars, one per month

- On September 23, the VAT hosted a congregational discussion and vote about whether to sign a Memoradum of Understanding with Indiana AID, in which we would become their organizational sponsor and formally adopt them as a "project" of Shalom. The measure passed with a 35-1 vote. To learn more about this, look for the recording of the discussion in our Members section.
- For those interested in the Facing Hard Questions discussion last Sunday about the history of Israel in light of archeology and world history and the challenge of dealing with political bias in Scripture, Brian's PowerPoint is attached. - <u>MennoExpressions Aug 8 Online</u> (see attached pdf for preview of articles). This issue includes articles by Martha and Emily.
- Gathering safely: Our local new Covid-19 case numbers continue to be high. In Marion County, our daily rate of new cases per 100,000 people has increased to 15.4, putting us in the "orange" category, in which large in-person gatherings are discouraged. Commission chairs discussed this information at our 9/1 meeting and it seems clear that it is not safe to gather for indoor worship this month and probably also next month. Instead, we encourage participants to make use of the grounds for outdoor small group meetings or informal gatherings, with masking and safe distancing. We continue to monitor the numbers and will update you from time to time.

Hamilton County is currently at 17.4 and surrounding counties are also in the orange category with the exception of Shelby County which has the highest rate in Indiana at 149.2.) ~ Martha

## Reflections on the Journey

## David, the model king

From 1 Samuel through Revelation, David is honored as one of the great heroes of the Bible, whose descendants (or descendant?) would rule forever. But to be perfectly honest with you, David is *not* one of my favorite characters. In my mind, he has too many faults that have been emulated and multiplied by many believers who have followed in his footsteps, including the extreme and severe violence he showed toward his enemies. So why was David honored in this way?

According to the Biblical narrative, the reason that God chose David to be the leader is because he was "a man after God's heart." (1 Samuel 13:14). For all of his flaws, David sought to follow the greatest commandment, which is to love the Lord your God with all of your heart, mind, soul, and strength. Everything that David did, he did to please God. He consistently looked to God for guidance rather than making decisions by himself. He trusted in God for protection rather than military power (although he certainly looked to that a secondary source of protection). And he worshipped God so fully that he was willing to debase himself in front of his people in order to please God. One of the particular ways that David sought to please God was by not killing Saul, even when Saul was trying to kill David. Despite having several opportunities to take Saul's life, David chose risky and costly non-violent options every time, because he understood that Saul was God's anointed. In the New Testament, Jesus teaches us that every person is an anointed child of God, and we might wonder how David would have led the people if he treated all of his enemies with the same care that he treated Saul, and later, Absalom. The more we learn about God, we more we see that loving God with all our hearts leads to loving our neighbors as ourselves.
