Faith Climate Action Week, April 16-25. What are regenerative farming practices and how do they help improve climate change? This type of farming, which includes planting cover crops, not tilling the soil and grazing livestock on pasture, can build nutrients in the soil, prevent erosion and improve overall soil health. These practices also create a vast carbon sink that can pull greenhouse gases out of the air and stores it in the ground. But it doesn't come without an overhaul of how farmers do what they've done their whole lives. Chris Baggott began farming in Hancock County, Indiana about 10 years ago. He set up a regenerative from the start. He grazes pigs, cows and other animals on pasture in a rotating pattern. He sells the pork, beef, chicken and other products on the Tyner Pond Farm website. ANNOUNCEMENTS

We are all feeling the loss of personal interactions with our friends, families, and our church brothers and sisters. The isolation has caused emotional stress for many of us. Shalom Leadership has discussed when we can start meeting together again. We don't know when that will be, but it is not now. Currently the number of people in our counties getting new cases of COVID 19 is going up and not down. Even though some of us, and hopefully soon most of us, have been vaccinated, we intend to hold off meeting for the above reason.

This will extend our time of physical separation. If you are feeling more depressed and lonely, please reach out to your friends, your Deacon, and fellow Shalom members with a phone call or an invitation to come and talk. CDC recommendations now state that individuals who are fully vaccinated can meet in person with small groups of people. If you have not been vaccinated (including the waiting period after the last vaccination), you may consider meeting with others with the proper protections of mask wearing and social distancing at least 6 feet apart. Now that the weather is getting warmer, you are encouraged to meet outside. By all means meet and renew friendships and get help for depression and loneliness. We are re-naming the fund, Mennonite Education Fund, because it will cover some non-college programs. Journey program (a joint program of Indiana-Michigan Mennonite Conference and Anabaptist Mennonite Biblical Seminary) was paid for in the past from Pastor-Elder Team funds, and we propose it be rolled into this fund. RELECTIONS ON THE JOURNEY

Between Easter and Pentecost - This Sunday, Gemima is going to be preaching from one of the most important stories in the Bible: the coming of the Holy Spirit upon Jesus' disciples. This dramatic event launches us into Act VI of the Biblical story, and there is even a day on the Christian calendar dedicated to celebrating it: Pentecost Sunday (which actually falls on May 23, not April 18). In order to make it through the Bible at a reasonable pace, we will be celebrating Pentecost a little early this year, but let's bear in mind that the coming of the Holy Spirit did not follow Easter immediately. For whatever reason, God chose to leave some time in-between these two events.

I always find myself struck by that gap of time between Easter and Pentecost, or at least between the Ascension and Pentecost, when the disciples were left on earth without Jesus. In Acts 1, Jesus offers some final words of encouragement to his disciples and then ascends higher and higher into the sky until he is hidden by a cloud, and the text gives us the impression that the disciples just stood there, somewhat dumbfounded, not sure what to do after he left. Apparently, they needed some encouragement to get back to work, because God sent two angelic messengers to ask them, "Why do you stand looking up toward heaven? This Jesus, who has been taken up from you into heaven, will come in the same way as you saw him go into heaven." (Acts 1:11) The disciples already knew this, but it seems they needed to be reminded of it anyway. I can imagine feeling dumbfounded at a moment like that, not to mention overwhelmed by the responsibility of carrying out Jesus' mission without him physically present to lead me any longer.

Actually, I think this is a fairly common experience. Well, not the ascension itself – that was something that only happened once – but the stunned reaction we sometimes have to seeing doors close or life change. The pandemic has been an extremely disorienting event for many of us, and perhaps some of us have been frozen in place as we have waited for it to pass – something that may take years to fully occur. Changes in our families, jobs, living situation, or health can have the same effect: we watch the life we knew fly away, and we struggle to move on. But perhaps we too can benefit from hearing God's messengers tell us: "You already know what to do. God has promised to be with you, and though life will be different, God will equip you with everything you need to make it. So let's get started!" At a certain point, the time comes when we have to stop looking upward and looking inward for the word from God that moves us forward. ~ **Brian**
