Milepost #320: The Discipline of Confession

As we enter the second month of 2018, we also move our attention to our second spiritual discipline for the year: confession. For me personally, this is a move into more familiar territory. As many of you know, I was raised in the Free Methodist Church, and while the Free Methodists did not put much emphasis on the discipline of simplicity, they did encourage confession. Ever since I was a teenager, I was encouraged to join accountability groups or partnerships in which the participants talked honestly about our spiritual successes and failures, as we encouraged each other in our walks with God. Although some of these accountability groups were more helpful to me than others, they have on the whole proved to be one of the most important sources of encouragement and moral transformation in my life.

John Wesley, the founder of the Methodist Church, expected everyone who joined his movement to participate in a "band" of five to ten believers, with whom they would meet regularly and practice confession. He offered these bands a list of questions to work through each week that guided their conversation, which included questions such as, "Is the love of God shed abroad in your heart?" "Has no sin, inward or outward, dominion over you?" and "Do you desire to be told of your faults?"

Of course, these questions could be quite intimidating at first, but as the groups became more comfortable with each other, the degree of trust grew over time, as did the moral progress of the participants. Indeed, one report suggests that the average person who participated in Wesley's bands experienced total liberation from the sins and doubts that plagued them after participating in one for two and a half years. This attests to the wisdom of James 5:16, "Therefore, confess your sins to one another and pray for one another so that you may be healed."

That being said, there are some concerns about confession that we must take seriously before jumping into it. When considering accountability partners, it is important to look for people who are trustworthy, with whom you are comfortable and yet who will speak truthfully to you, and with whom it is appropriate to engage in such intimate sharing. It is possible for confession to become harmful if any of these factors are missed, so careful discernment is necessary.

When done well, confession is a life-giving experience, and I would encourage us all to seek some form of spiritual accountability as a way of practicing confession in February. Such a relationship doesn't have to be as intense as Wesley envisioned, as it can be limited to just one area of growth, focusing on lighter issues before engaging heavier ones. In any case, I pray that we can all experience the forgiveness of Christ through the compassionate listening of another human being in the experience of confession.
