Next Sunday (5/9) we will study a number of the later epistles in the New Testament and confront the greatest challenge that the early church - and arguably the Church today - has to face: distinguishing between false prophets who distort the gospel and true ones who speak the word of God.

Continuing Support for Gemima and family: Success! For 3 years, we have provided monthly financial support to Gemima and her family! Every 6 months a group of 10 people (7 from Shalom) evaluate the on-going need for monthly financial support for Gemima and her daughters that we began providing in 2018. The group has conducted the April evaluation and would like to invite Shalom members to continue donating to this fund so that the \$600 of monthly support can be provided for May-October. The primary reason for the support to continue is that Gemima's work permit has not yet arrived and there is no clear timeline on when she can expect it (even though it was authorized in August 2020).

The family is doing well with Melanie finishing her first year at IUPUI with a full scholarship. Jackie will be graduating from high school and joining the US Air Force in June. Lorraine has one more year of high school and has a 21st Century Scholarship to will cover tuition to attend an Indiana state school.

RELECTIONS ON THE JOURNEY

Paul's Missionary Success: This week, we are finishing the book of Acts, which brings us to the end of the Biblical history of God's people, although the story of the church continued long after the Bible was finished being written and continues to this day, and the Bible ends by giving us a sneak peek of Act VII, which is yet to come. The final portion of Acts highlights two simultaneous movements that were taking off in those early years: the spread of the gospel across the world known to the Jews and the equally intense backlash and resistance to the gospel. Herb will be focusing on the latter theme in his sermon on Sunday, so I want to offer a few thoughts about the positive missionary work of Paul in this reflection.

Paul was an extraordinarily influential individual. While churches like ours struggle to bring in a few new people to faith in Christ, Paul seemed to convert dozens, if not hundreds, of people everywhere he went. Now, as I noted in my sermon on the Great Commission, there are some significant differences between the context we live in and the context Paul lived in, which make it more challenging for us to have the same kind of missionary success. Nevertheless, there is much that we can learn from him as we seek to share the gospel with people in our time and place.

Although there are many aspects of Paul's ministry that deserve mention, the one that jumps out to me the most is his receptivity to the Holy Spirit. For example, consider this passage from Acts 16:7-10 that discusses Paul's travel plans: "When they had come opposite Mysia, they attempted to go into Bithynia, but the Spirit of Jesus did not allow them; so passing by Mysia, they went down to Troas. During the night, Paul had a vision: there stood a man of Macedonia... When he had seen the vision, we immediately tried to cross over to Macedonia, being convinced that God had called us to proclaim the good news to them."

Paul was constantly listening to the Holy Spirit for guidance, and when he felt a prompting from the Spirit, he immediately acted upon it. This passage shows how Paul would instantly change plans if he sensed the Spirit of Jesus telling him to do so. Acts describes this characteristic as "boldness" and presents it as a Christian virtue. Now, boldness should not be understood as "rudeness" or a willingness to offend others. In fact, Paul went out of his way not to offend people unnecessarily, and our readings also made it clear that Christians should speak to all people "with gentleness and respect" (1 Peter 3:15-16). Instead, boldness is learning to trust that the promptings of the Spirit within you really are from God and to act upon them.

If we really want to make progress as a church in our evangelistic call, I believe that the key is learning to listen more closely to the Holy Spirit everywhere we go and learning to trust and act upon the Spirit's promptings. This is a skill that has to be practiced, and it is much easier to write about it than it is to do it. But I believe that God has a lot to say to us if we have the patience to listen and the courage to act upon it. ~ **Brian**
