Nobel Peace Prize

Congratulations to Abiy Ahmed, Prime Minister of Ethiopia, and the the members of Shalom who have special connections with Ethiopia, on his being honored with the Nobel Peace Prize. After Ahmed was elected last year he immediately began negotiating a peace treaty to end violent conflict with neighboring Eritrea, which he completed within three months. He has also led major reforms to expand human rights, to expand educational opportunities, and to protect the environment. His Green Legacy Tree Planting Program aims to plant 4.7 billion trees. Our Ethiopian partner Meserete Kristos College participated in planting over 350 million trees in one day!

Reflections On Pilgrimage

Our friend and mentor Pastor Jose Manuel Guaman Malan of the indigenous Mennonite churches in Ecuador ICME sent us this communication:

"Last night, [Sunday, October 13] the indigenous peoples and the government of Ecuador agreed not to implement the measures taken by the government and to stop the indigenous protest. I thank you all for your solidarity, fraternal relations and prayers to the God of life.

Peace has returned, but we must work for justice; so that peace is the fruit of it."

This is amazing news for a nation that had been suffering for more than 11 days. We must also remember that the indigenous nations have been suffering for several hundred years up until now. We have to hope that brothers with ponchos or paint on their faces and sisters in anakos will be treated differently than they were a few weeks ago before this effort of so many indigenous brothers and sisters. I asked my friend Julian Guaman what he thought about these last few days, he said:

"The repeal of the Decree 883 that ended subsidies for fuel in Ecuador, is a symbol of struggle, resistance and dignity. What comes in the new Decree will mark the political direction of the country."

These are only a few steps on the long arduous road of a people who have endured much. But we are reminded to have joy in suffering.

2 Consider it pure joy, my brothers and sisters, whenever you face trials of many kinds, 3 because you know that the testing of your faith produces perseverance. 4 Let perseverance finish its work so that you may be mature and complete, not lacking anything. - James 1:2-4

This is an opportunity as a global church to remember to pray and rejoice even in suffering. These days after so much movement in the Ecuadorian capital there have been many messages of thanks that the church was able to share food and other aid during the days when there was almost no movement in the city and it was even difficult to get food in some sectors. Now we are able to rejoice when, these trials have been overcome but we must remember that many more will come and we must continue to rejoice and join in prayer as the global body of Christ joins together with the Holy Spirit.

Those who are in positions of power will try to push us right or left or exclaim that we are listening to only one side or the other. But we have to remember to look all around us, to the left, right, up, down and also forward. In unity and together with the Holy Spirit we are much stronger than any political party, any economic proposal, any advice from the right or left, we must go deeper and further. When we are drawn together in prayer we are able to see the face of Christ.
