RELECTIONS ON THE JOURNEY

Enduring to the End of the Pandemic - As the weather is getting warmer, an increasing number of people are getting vaccinated, and businesses are announcing their plans to re-open. I've observed a palpable sense of excitement among the people whom I've seen in the past few weeks, and this is perfectly understandable. After a long winter, it's starting to feel like we can see the light at the end of the tunnel of this pandemic. Thank God for that! However, we are not out of the woods yet. The majority of Americans have not been vaccinated. New variants of the virus are still developing. People are still dying. Yesterday alone, more than a thousand people died of COVID-19 in the United States.

In light of this, a verse from our main Scripture text last week has been on my mind: "The one who endures to the end will be saved." (Matthew 24:13) Here we have an encouragement to "finish strong." It's always hard to persevere or endure, but even more so when the end is in sight and it's tempting to take our foot off the pedal for a little bit. This is why Jesus emphasized enduring to the end. In our case, that means continuing to social distance, wear masks, and abstain from group activities as much as possible until it is safe for everyone involved.

Ok, ok – I confess, I am taking this passage out of context. The "end" that Jesus is speaking about is his return, not the end of the pandemic. However, I don't think it is an inappropriate use of this concept. Scripture is filled with lessons like this about persevering, which can apply to many different situations. As James says, "My brothers and sisters, whenever you face trials of any kind, consider it nothing but joy because you know that the testing of your faith produces perseverance; and let perseverance have its full effect so that you may be mature and complete, lacking in nothing." (James 1:2-4, emphasis added). The pandemic we are experiencing certainly constitutes a trial, and we are in a moment that calls for perseverance, so we would do well to heed any Scriptural lessons that help us do this.

Or perhaps I should just speak for myself: I am finding myself more reluctant to put on the mask, more ready to take risks, more tempted to "break the rules." And there are situations when it may be appropriate or necessary to do so. However, I try to keep in mind that the "rules" are not set arbitrarily to control us, but they are designed to protect people. So let us remain vigilant until the very end, doing our best to keep this virus from spreading while still taking advantage of the safe opportunities that spring and summer bring.

Early in the pandemic, Shane Claiborne made a comment that has stuck with me: "Wouldn't it be great if churches were the last places to reopen because of how obsessed we are with loving our neighbors and protecting the most vulnerable?" I'm not sure if I want Shalom to be the last place to reopen, but I appreciate the sentiment here: our caution is an expression of our love, so let us endure in this "to the end" out of love for the most vulnerable among us. ~ **Brian**
