OUTREACH: Relationships beyond Shalom

Shalom Friends.

Those of you who participated in worship on Sunday heard the announcement that Shalom has a surplus of funds this year, partly because we have not yet hired a second staff person, and because expenses are less since we have not been meeting face to face. When the Budget Committee met recently, we decided to let you know about this, and to seek your counsel on whether you know about needs that we should consider supporting with some of our surplus funds.

If you know of needs at the local, state, national, or global level that you think we should support, please let us know about organizations or agencies that you think Shalom should contribute to beyond our approved 2020 budget. (This could involve organizations that are not in our budget, or increased giving to those that are in our budget.)

One specific need that we have become aware of involves Morning Star Mennonite congregation in Muncie, which we support through our budget and through contributing food. A major ministry of Morning Star is the food pantry that they operate regularly for food-needy people of Muncie. Their cooling appliances have given out, and need to be replaced. This is an urgent need because a Thanksgiving food distribution program is an important part of Morning Star's ministry.

During worship last Sunday we decided to contribute \$1,000.00 beyond our budget to Morning Star. (An additional \$500.00 private contribution was added to that.) Frank Kandel has been Shalom's liaison with Morning Star. Yesterday Frank delivered the \$1,500.00 to them and asked them what their long-range needs are for cooling appliances. They need three new freezers and one new refrigerator, for a total cost of about \$3,200.00. The Outreach Commission recommends that Shalom contribute an additional \$1,700.00 to Morning Star, to meet their needs. Reflections on the Journey

Reflection: From Abraham to Zerubbabel

As we come to the end of the Old Testament narrative, it's not entirely clear where relationship between God and Israel stands. On the one hand, it seems that special relationship between God and the nation of Israel ended with the Babylonian conquest of Jerusalem. The temple was destroyed, the people were deported from the land, and the last King of Judah had to watch as all of his potential heirs were killed. On the other hand, it seems that the covenant with Israel either survived or was being revived. After all, the people were allowed back in the land and the temple was rebuilt. Likewise, it wasn't clear what the Jews were supposed to make of their new political situation. Fortunately, they had religious freedom and could worship Yahweh according to their law, but they were now under the patronage of a pagan emperor. Would this servitude be temporary or permanent? These questions are not fully resolved in the Older Testament, and I would argue that they are most fully embodied in the figure of Zerubbabel.

If you read Ezra and Nehemiah, then you're probably aware that Zerubbabel was the leader of the first waves of Jews to return to Jerusalem after Cyrus defeated the Babylonians. But Zerubbabel is important for another reason: he is the last prominent figure who descended from King David. Let's review the history here. Before Zedekiah, the last king of Judah, was killed, Nebuchadnezzar kidnapped the previous king, Jeconiah, who was also a descendant of David, and put him under house arrest in Babylon. After Nebuchadnezzar died, his successor set Jeconiah free and allowed him and his family to live comfortably in Babylon. In 1 Chronicles 3, we learn the names of Jeconiah's descendants. Among them, he had a son named Shealtiel and a grandson named Zerubbabel. Then, in Ezra 3:2, a person named "Zerubbabel son of Shealtiel" emerges as a leader of the Jewish community and sets out to rebuild the temple in Jerusalem. In all likelihood, this Zerubbabel was the descendant of the exiled King Jeconiah, who was in the royal line of David. As a member of the royal line, Zerubbabel could very plausibly claim to be the king and rightful heir of Judah. However, he didn't make that claim. Instead, he contented himself with being Persia's appointed governor over the region.

The prophets give mixed messages about Zerubbabel as well. Jeremiah famously issued a "curse" over the line of Jeconiah (or "Coniah") saying, "As I live, says the LORD, even if King Coniah son of Jehoiakim of Judah were the signet ring on my right hand, even from there I would tear you off and give you into the hands of those who seek your life, into the hands of those of whom you are afraid, even into the hands of King Nebuchadrezzar of Babylon and into the hands of the Chaldeans. will hurl you and the mother who bore you into another country, where you were not born, and there you shall die. But they shall not return to the land to which they long to return." Many people take this and the lines that follow as evidence that the Davidic dynasty was over. However, at the end of the book of Haggai, the prophet says, "Speak to Zerubbabel, governor of Judah, saying, 'I am about to shake the heavens and the earth, and to overthrow the throne of kingdoms... On that day, says the LORD of hosts, I will take you, O Zerubbabel my servant, son of Shealtiel, says the LORD, and make you like a signet ring; for I have chosen you, says the LORD of hosts." By claiming Zerubbabel as a signet ring, God seems to be reversing the curse of Jeremiah.

The odd thing is that Zerubbabel never lived to see the Persian empire overthrown, and none of his descendants became kings in the traditional sense. In fact, the descendants of David seemed to fade out of history. This is largely because new Jewish leaders emerged such as Nehemiah, the Hasmoneans, and Herod the Great - none of whom were even descended from Judah. But it doesn't mean that the descendents of Zerubbabel had died off; it just means they disappeared from view. Theoretically, it was possible that one of Zerubbabel's descendants, living among them, would rise up and restore the David dynasty. And this is precisely what the Bible claims about Jesus of Nazareth. (See Matthew 1:12-13) Jesus was a descendant of Zerubbabel, which also means he was a descendant of David, of Judah, and of Abraham and Sarah, for that matter. Although he was not a ruler in the traditional sense, Christians believe that all of the promises given from Abraham to Zerubbabel about having a descendant who would rule would be met in him.
