The Threshold of a New Year

Like many church congregations this past week, we have just experienced a beautiful celebration of Christmas, rejoicing in the birth of Christ with glorious and soul-stirring music, colors, candlelight, teachings and beloved stories of the Divine in our midst! Now, as we move into the new year, let's remember that the life of Jesus continues to live in us when we, like Mary, say "yes" to what God desires to do in and through us.

Recently I happened upon this quote from the 14th century mystic priest, Meister Eckhart:

We are all meant to be mothers of God. What good is it to me if this eternal birth of the Divine Son takes place unceasingly, but does not take place within myself? And what good is it to me if Mary is full of grace, but I am not also full of grace? What good is it to me for the Creator to give birth to [the] Son if I do not also give birth to him in my time and culture? This, then, is the fullness of time: when the Son of God is begotten in us.

As a baby is born, the process that occurs between labor and delivery is called "transition" and it's the most intense stage of childbirth. Often I have reflected on our Shalom transition period in this way--like the pain and joy of bringing a child into the world. Here we are at the threshold of a new year and, in what sometimes feels like the slowest birthing ever, we still seem to be in transition!

Perhaps it's time for us to think of it in a new way--no longer as transition with all the travailing and contracting and stretching--but as delivery. Many expectant parents don't feel ready for the baby to arrive. The due date is fast approaching and they still haven't painted the nursery, built the crib, bought the car seats--so much to do!! Meanwhile, Baby doesn't wait for all the t's to be crossed and i's dotted! When it's time, it's time.

Regardless of where we are in our journey as a congregation, as we continue to adjust to our new structure and await the "advent" of a new pastoral team member, in the words of our Lord Jesus himself, "the time is coming, and now is" for the Christ child to be born in us

and for the world. May we have Mary's courage and grace to serve as "mother of God" and give birth to Christ within ourselves, embodying the Christ-life in our "time and culture."
